Calvary Baptist Church voted on Sunday, April 27, in their 10:30 AM Service to begin a Christian School. This vote also included the beginning of a Christian Pre-school as well as a Christian Grade School, Kindergarten through Grade Six if there is sufficient interest. The positive benefits of a Christian School education figured strongly in the vote to begin a Christian School in the fall of 1980.

Some of the factors that had a strong influence in the vote to begin a Christian school are:

1. The Bible and its moral principles can be read and taught in a Christian School.
2. God as the Creator can be honored and recognized as God and Christ can be recognized as the Saviour.
3. The text books can be distinctly Christian.
4. Open prayer can be engaged in by the students and staff.
5. The modern day problems of society can be looked at in the light of the Word of God.
6. A Christian atmosphere with Christian discipline can be maintained.

Calvary Christian School will be open to all children of all Faiths and will stress Bible truth rather than church doctrine. It will also teach patriotism and allegiance to our American ideals.

Certified teachers will be hired and high academics will be maintained.
