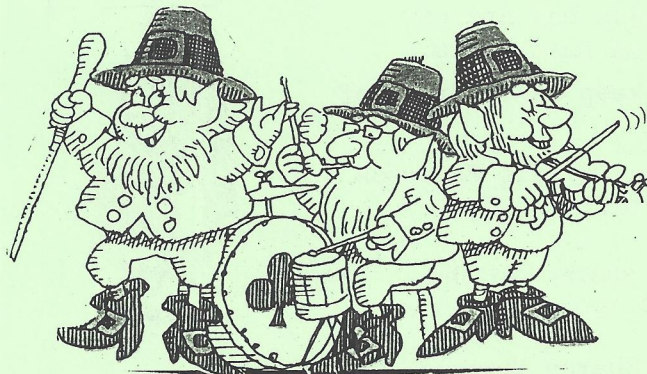

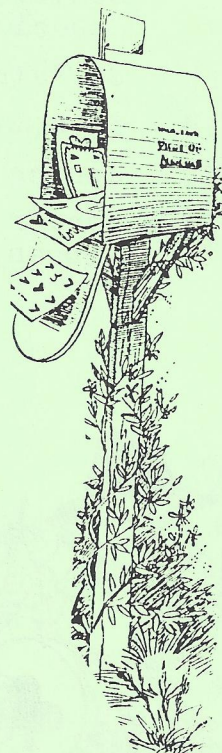

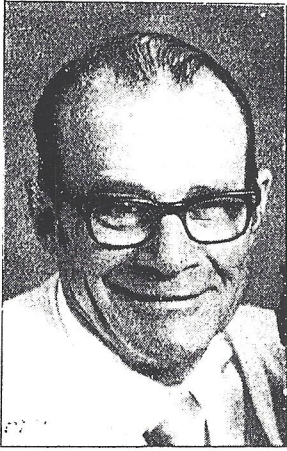

The Fertile community is saddened by the death of a longtime resident of the community, Dick Sheimo, 70, who passed away at the North Iowa Mercy Health Center East on February 3, 1995. Our deepest sympathy is extended to his wife Ardis and son Tom and his wife Nance and granddaughter Trisca Dee. Also surviving are two brothers, Frank of Fertile and Harold of Clear Lake.

Dick was born on a farm west of Fertile on December 27, 1924, the son of Henry and Ellen (Novland) Sheimo. He attended the Fertile school and graduated from Fertile High School in 1943.

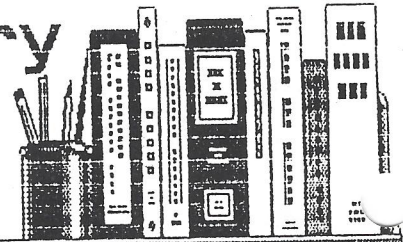
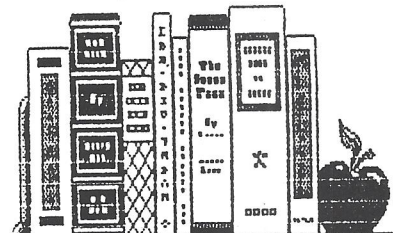

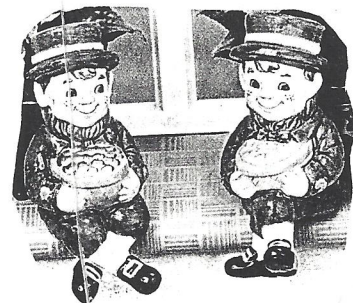

## *We Lost*

High School basketball teams around the country are hoping to time their peaks in proficiency with tournaments to determine a State Champion. Local enthusiasm for round ball teams in middle America is almost boundless. When we lived in Indiana sports writers referred to this frenzy as "Hoosier Hysteria." It always seemed to me that the Hawkeye strain of this was as wild as that found east of the Wabash River.

The Fertile "Indians" began our season earlier than some of the other towns in the area because we had no football program. I always hated "getting into condition," as coach Wistey called it. This consisted of wind sprints across the gym from end to end, times on end, it seemed. There were also the "fifteen times around the floor" before we could hit the showers. Our team practiced the basics a lot, and to this day I can spot poor player habits, whether college or professional players are practicing them.

Our *second* game of 1948-49 was with Ventura, Iowa. That school **did** have football and this was their *first* game of the basketball year. Early during the first quarter I tried to cut between two defenders on a drive to the basket. One of them, perhaps thinking this was an end run, stuck out a leg, tripped me, and took me out of competition for the next six weeks. Today a torn cartilage would be repaired with arthroscopic surgery followed by a quick recovery, but back then it was lots of tape and time, and "stay off the leg." Usually we played two thirty-two minute games a week, so I was out for ten or twelve games, including one cliff hanger with Grafton. During that game I could hardly stay on the bench. Even though the knee was still tender I returned to the team the next week. Henry Pederson, "Teed" Elthon, Kenny Midtgaard, Dale Lindquist Bill Upchurch, Duane Carr, Larry Purcell, Arlyn Brosdahl, Jim Pierce, my brother, Dale, and Dick Varberg had gotten along well without me, but I was delighted to be back in the competition.

The Iowa state champion was determined by a series of elimination tournaments. Winners advanced from the Sectionals to the District, the Semi-finals and at last to the State Tournament in Iowa City. The second time we faced the Ventura "Vikings" was during the final game of our Sectional tourney, held in Ventura that year. From the final score one might conclude that the game was a defensive masterpiece, but, in fact, neither team had much effective scoring power. During the second half I decided to begin driving to the basket in an effort to score, and was successful several times. The game was being covered by local radio, and out on the farm twenty miles away, Grandpa Kuns was listening. The sportscaster must have made my efforts sound better than they really were because several weeks later Grandpa told Dad how proud he was to hear, "Kuns drives to the basket again ...and scores!"

It was a pretty good way to end my High School basketball career, but there wasn't really a lot to be proud about. We lost by a score of 38 to 39.

FERTILE FIRE DEPT. NEWS

The Fertile Fire Department is proud to announce that we have 17 volunteer firepersons.

Members of the Fire Department have been working hard taking classes to meet state requirements. We are certified in CPR, Bloodborne Patogens, and Hazardous materials. We have been trained in these areas and know that everyones personal safety comes first.

We have inspected our trucks and have made necessary repairs to make them safe and in working condition. We have purchased a new communications radio for our main truck. We would eventually like to purchase a better radio for our tanker and have a base radio at the fire station. Communication is very important when fighting a fire or during a medical emergency.

We have one person, Brenda Ray, that is certified as a 1st Responder and two other people that need to test for their certification.

Equipment at the Fire Station has been inspected and some necessary updates have been made but we are in need of a lot of new equipment. We have purchased 2 new fire hats, 3 pair of boots and enough gloves for each member. We have updated 2 of our air tanks and masks so they are useable, but we need funds to update our other 2 air tanks and masks. If we had a fire and needed to go inside to rescue someone, we need to send two firemen in at a time. And we need to have two more back-up tanks and persons in case something happens to the 1st two firemen. We only have 4 fire uniforms that could be safe fighting a fire closeup. We are in desperate need of new uniforms that would ensure the safety of our volunteer firefighters.

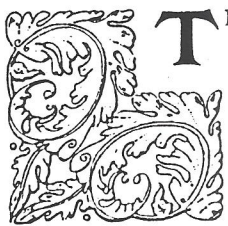

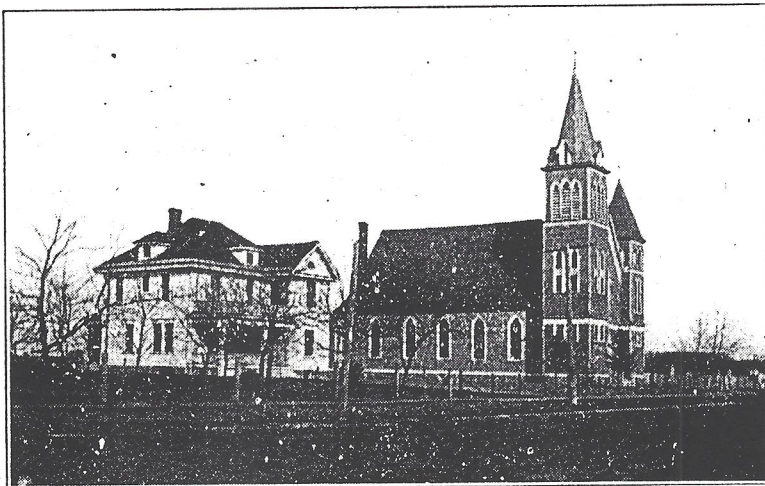
# Worth County Towns

## MANLY

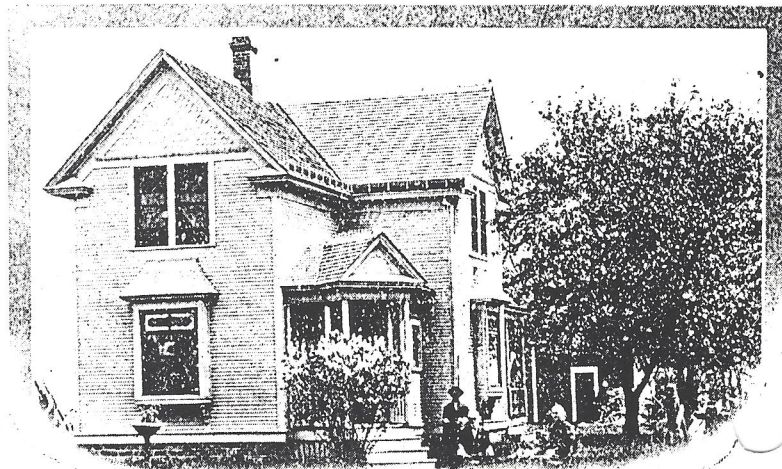


**T**HIS TOWN has superior advantages in many ways. Being a Junction, its shipping facilities are largely enhanced—but these are not the only prerequisites—for, very fortunately, back of this stands a long line of progressive merchants, men who have been actively in the harness ever since tugs were hand sewed, and they, today, are as a monument, erected and dedicated to this locality. The town is laid out upon the southeast quarter of the southeast quarter of Section 21, Township 88 north, Range 20 west, and owes its existence to the B., C. R. & N. and Iowa Central railways, which was consummated during the year 1877. The earliest settlers were N. E. Knudson, A. W. Harris, G. L. Bosworth, H. N. Keeler and George Hildreth. H. N. Keeler started the first general merchandise store in 1878. A. H. Harris, however, conducted a small store in 1877. In 1880 N. E. Knudson opened a general merchandise store. In the same year the Messrs. Warbasse & Lee, of Mason City, opened a branch hardware store, and A. B. Tuttle, of the same town, launched out into the dry goods store. H. H. Harris was the first lumber merchant, commencing in 1877, being succeeded in 1878 by G. L. Bosworth on an enlarged scale. Mitchell & Wadsworth conducted the first creamery, in 1880. The first blacksmith was A. Draper, dating from 1878. In 1882 B. Logeman opened a rival shop. He is still located there, and has added farm implements to his line. Manly has, since its inception, been one of the grain centers of Worth County. The first postoffice was established in 1877, with A. W. Harris as the stamp seller. W. D. McKercher is the present incumbent, and not only enjoys an enviable reputation along the lines of civil service, but his expectation is elongated. Today Manly's star is in the ascendancy—brighter and better than ever—yet she carries her pride with a dignity becoming. Those who know her best accept her kindly invitation with seriousness, and are grasping every opportunity to avail themselves of the pleasure afforded them in reciprocation. With a strong financial institution, good creamery, elevators and lumber yard, furniture, general merchandise stores, hotel and restaurants, its beautiful residence and church buildings, and general air of progressiveness, it possesses an independence which declares itself territorily.

A brief review of this town would be incomplete without mention of Sacred Heart Church and parsonage. The Rev. Father Ehl presides, and enjoys the distinction of appreciation over one of the largest congregations in this section of the country. The fraternal orders are strong, notably the Odd Fellows, who own their own building, a two-story, double-front brick, and one of the most imposing buildings in the town, the second story being used for lodge work exclusively, the lower being occupied by the Messrs. McKercher and Peshak in their representative lines.

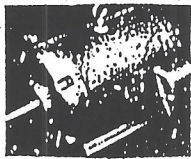

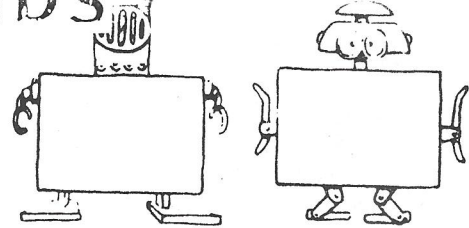


## CREAM OF BROCCOLI SOUP

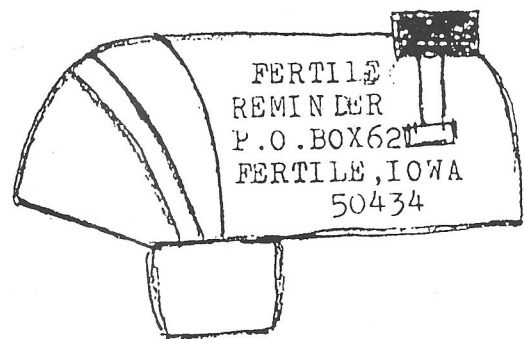
